# Ai Weiwei "Be disappeared": Responds from Local Artists

On 3 April, 2011, Beijing-based contemporary artist Ai Weiwei was being intercepted at the Beijing Capital International Airport during the way to Taipei via Hong Kong, His news was blocked for 81 days. The "Be disappeared" of Ai Weiwei strongly echoes in all sectors of society in Hong Kong, local artists initiated activities with groups or individuals, to show their support of Ai Weiwei through different forms of Creativity.

 On 4 April
Local newspapers reported that Ai Weiweiges detained at Beijing airport on 3 April when he was about to board a flight to Hong Kong.

 On 12 April
According to Apple Datty, graffiti with Ai Weiwei's face and the words "Who's afraid of Ai Weiwei?" in Chinese and English began appearing around Hong Kong, the graffiti artist then posted photos on the Internet.

The media called the artist "Graffiti Girl". The West Kowloon Regional Crimes Unit has launched an investigation into the Ai Weiwei-inspired graffiti, which was denounced "White Terror". The matter set off a wave of graffiti in Hong Kong, districts then appeared different patterns of Ai Weiwei sprayed graffiti.

## On 17 April

Artist Tong Wai-chun performed art at the Times Square to show solidarity with Ai for several days. He only wore black underpants, with A4 paper that printed with Ai Weiwei's face attached to his waist, imitating Ai Weiwei's Block central. The media called him "Shirtless Man".

## On 22 April •

On the evening, members of Art citizens set booth at East Point Road Pedestrian walkway in Causeway Bay, in solidarity with Ai Weiwei.

### On 23 April •

Art Citizens initiated "423 Art Citizens March", starting from Mongkok at 3 pm, through Nathan Road and Canton Road, to the Hong Kong Cultural Centre in Tsim Sha Tsui. The match encouraged participants to use any creative way to voice out for solidarity with Ai Weiwei. The group then held an evening gathering at the Cultural Gentre.

### On 29 April •

Newspapers posted an interview of the 25-year-old "Flash graffiti" artist Cpak Ming. We projected an image of Ai Weiwei with words "Who's Afraid of Ai Weiwei?" on buildings of the Liaison Office, Police Headquarters and People's Liberation Army barracks. He took pictures and posted on the Facebook afterward. The album of 28 photos imitated others to follow. All rights rese

### On 30 April •

Local newspapers reported that there were four graffiti artist spraved up to hundreds of graffiti in Tsuen Wan within days. They were exposed since the CCTV of nearby restaurants had captured the incident process.

On 3 May

the University of The Hong Kong Alliance in Support of Patriotic Democratic Movements in China organized "1001 Chairs for Ai Weiwei and arrested dissidents". About 2000 rotesters in Victoria Park using chairs to create a formation represents the Chinese word "prisoner" (囚), and some participants using performance art to show solidarity with arrested dissidents in mainland.

On the same day, Art Citerins initiated "A Symphony of Ai Weiwei" (艾未未魅影幻香江), in which using flashlight to project image of Ai Weiwei on the exterior wall of the Hong Kong Museum of Art during A Symphony of Lights at the Victoria Harbour.

On the same day, more than 12 artists, cartoonist and musician using a "Non-cooperate Method" in solidarity with Ai Weiwei ar the Times Square in Causeway Bay, including pacing, calling for Ai Weiwei to back home, water spray graffiti on the floor, and posting notices on the ground etc.

## On 7 May •

According to Oriental Daily and The Sun, Ai-inspired graffiti appeared at Tung Chung MTR Station.

## On 26 May •

Hong Kong International Art Fair held at the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre, Swiss gallery Galarie Urs Meile exhibited Ai Weiwei's work Marble Arm.
