# Visual Arts Activities for the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Hong Kong's Handover: Painting Two Different Pictures

2017 is the year that marked the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Hong Kong's Handover to China. A series of related activities took place, government- or community-led. The Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) established an inter-departmental Steering Committee (with Chief Secretary for Administration Cheung Kin-chung Matthew as the president) at the end of 2016 to plan the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrating events. They earmarked \$640 million to be spent on a series of local and overseas celebratory activities organized by the Home Affairs Bureau, Development Bureau, Leisure and Cultural Services Department, Information Services Department, and Planning Department. The Mainland also played an active role and provided resources to facilitate the organization of the activities, for example, by lending out artifacts. Art associations and interest groups at the community level organized various visual arts exhibitions in the name of "Celebrating Handover Anniversary." In addition, Chinese-funded media groups, culture companies, overseas Chinese associations and business associations put together similar visual arts events.

On the other hand, independent art practitioners and groups ran activities to reflect on, or even protested against, the Handover Anniversary, resulting in a scene distinctly different from that of the government and the pro-China associations. There was a wide disparity in scale and resources between the two camps without any overlap in regard to the participating artists and publicity channels used.<sup>2</sup> Official and pro-China organizations adopted a narrative entirely different from that of the independent arts groups. The former put forward the ideas of "promoting and perpetuating Chinese culture," "expressing patriotic sentiments," "restoring the spirit of Chinese civilization," "developing a stronger sense of national identity," "Chinese artists," "a hub of cultural exchange," "east meeting west," "integrating traditional and modern beliefs," "promoting Hong Kong cultural and creative industries," "showcasing achievements," "painting and calligraphy as essential components of Chinese culture," "brushwork and skill," and "combining traditional ink painting and contemporary art technique," etc. The latter looked into "1997," "identity," "locality," "dilemmas of the individual," "artistic labor," "art space," "political censorship," "political sensitivity," "operation of arts groups," "social movements," and the "Hong Kong-China relationship," etc.<sup>3</sup>

The official and pro-China organizations planned a large number of activities, in general homogenously festive. In comparison, independent arts groups were more concerned about deconstructing historical events and offering critical reviews by deploying contemporary art forms (including performance art, installation, video, mixed media, etc.). In comparison to the visual arts activities for the celebration of the 10<sup>th</sup> Handover Anniversary, 2017 events were highly similar in nature and approach, both for the official and pro-China organizations. Their perceptions of Hong Kong's cultural positioning and development of visual art remained basically unchanged, while the independent arts groups and artists continued their reflection on the issues concerning the handover at the political, social and cultural levels.

The designs were poorly received, as comic artist Wong Chiu-tat Justin criticized them for "being cultural symbols that are cliches heard over and over again and slogans to paper over the cracks."
February 23	Financial Secretary	According to the Budget Speech for 2017/2018, the Government allocated extra funds for the celebration of Handover anniversary. Financial Secretary Chan Mo-po Paul said that apart from the regular funding programs run by the Home Affairs Bureau and the Hong Kong Arts Development Council, on the occasion of Handover anniversary, the Government would financially support more performances of local arts groups and artists in Mainland China and abroad in order to demonstrate the city's cultural strength. Local arts groups and artists would be invited, and financially supported, to many of the celebratory events held in around eighty cities all over the world by the Economic and Trade Offices. Chan also spoke of a series of exhibitions subsidized by the Government that would show the world Hong Kong's flourishing creative industries. A government source said the Government had deployed at least \$39.5 million to relevant events. The design exhibitions staged in Hong Kong, five Mainland and three overseas cities costed \$29.5 million. They showcased Hong Kong achievements in fashion, interior and branding design since the handover.
April 4	Home Affairs Bureau	In response to a LegCo member's inquiry on government expenditure, the HAB said that the Government had earmarked a provision of \$640 million for hosting or sponsoring various celebratory events for the Handover anniversary and would hold more than 300 of those events locally in Hong Kong and bout 200 Mainland and overseas cities. The HAB set aside \$76 million for its organization of celebratory arts and cultural events (\$32.6 million) and the operation of the Celebrations Coordination Office (\$20.7 million).

The total expenses in phase 1 amounted to HK\$600,000, including production, design and maintenance fees. April– December	Leisure and Cultural Services Department	The Department set aside \$190 million to organize activities to celebrate the Handover anniversary, including five major exhibitions: (1) "Eternal Life: Exploring Ancient Egypt" (Hong Kong Science Museum) with around 200 objects and six Egyptian mummies from the collection of the British Museum, (2) "Inventing le Louvre: From Palace to Museum over 800 Years" (Hong Kong Heritage Museum) in which more than 130 masterworks from the Louvre, including a Rembrandt's print in its first state, were displayed; (3) "Hall of Mental Cultivation of the Palace Museum: Imperial Residence of Eight Emperors"; (4) "Longevity and Virtues: Birthday Celebrations of the Qing Emperors and Empress Dowagers"; (5) A large-scale exhibition on the Silk Road with around 200 cultural relics of the Chang'an—Tianshan Corridor from Gansu, Henan, Shaanxi and Xinjiang. More than half of the exhibits were classified as grade-one national treasures. This exhibition had the highest ratio of grade-one relics among Hong Kong's exhibitions featuring national treasures, notwithstanding the regular limitation of grade-one relics on loan lower than one-fifth of the total number of exhibits."

June 19– November 30	Development Bureau and Planning Department	"Hong Kong ∞ Impression" showcased Hong Kong's achievements in city planning and infrastructure development over the past 20 years. The exhibition comprised of four thematic zones: Liveable, Visionary, Cultural and Playful which together presented the infinite future possibilities for the city. On August 18, an exhibit presenting a collection of old newspaper headlines was "allegedly brought under political censorship." The outdoor installation <i>DynamiCity</i> , created by XCEED, consisted of four screen panels showing data of different times. It focused on four themes, namely films, typhoons, newspapers and public architecture, to present how Hong Kong had changed over the last twenty years. The "newspapers" theme was a collection of close to 10,000 headline keywords displayed randomly on the screens resembling database interfaces, on which the keywords were red-bordered white text against a black background. Cheung Hon-him Chris, Artistic Director of XCEED, said in an interview that the Government had many concerns about the curatorial process, since the officials did not want to see any negative elements in the artwork in a celebration event. XCEED could not reach a consensus with the organizer, and the venue was not available for the setting-up due to bad weather, rendering the artwork incomplete when the exhibition opened. The team explained to the Department that the data was objective and neutral, as it was collected from the libraries and presented using data visualization, while an algorithm was used to calculate the random frequency. After multiple rounds of explanations, the Department accepted the creative direction and allowed a complete version of <i>DynamiCity</i> to be shown in the City Gallery's outdoor exhibition zone, which opened at the end of June. The Planning Department responded to media inquiry, claiming it contradicted with the fact to say the Department asked XCEED not to display "sensitive words" in the installation at the opening ceremony; the Department did not dispute how XCEED conveyed th
